

How to have a happy, safe and housetrained pup!

- Crates are an excellent way to contain your dog for traveling, while you are away and housetraining.
- Crate training revolves around the dog's need to have a safe and secure place to eat and sleep. For wolves in the wild, their den is their comfort zone—a crate can act as a den for your dog.
- It is useful for housebreaking because dogs generally do not relieve themselves in the same place they eat and sleep. Toilet training becomes simply a matter of taking the pup out to the designated spot after being in the crate and rewarding profusely.
- They are ideal for allowing the dog to feel comfortable and at home on holidays or on outings. You can train your dog to go to his crate when visitors arrive to your house, making arrivals a less stressful affair for everyone.
- They also keep your new pup safe from many hazards such as chewing electrical cords, furniture and chemicals.
- Dogs should always have plenty of mental stimulation and toys when left in a crate such as: Kongs, Buster Cubes, pigs ears, raw bones and strong safe chew toys. Always make sure the dog gets physical exercise before and after being in a crate. This way, its mental and physical requirements may be met.
- A pup that is crate trained grows into a happy, well adjusted and portable dog!
- **Note: Pups should not be left in crates for long periods of time ie: 2 hours**
